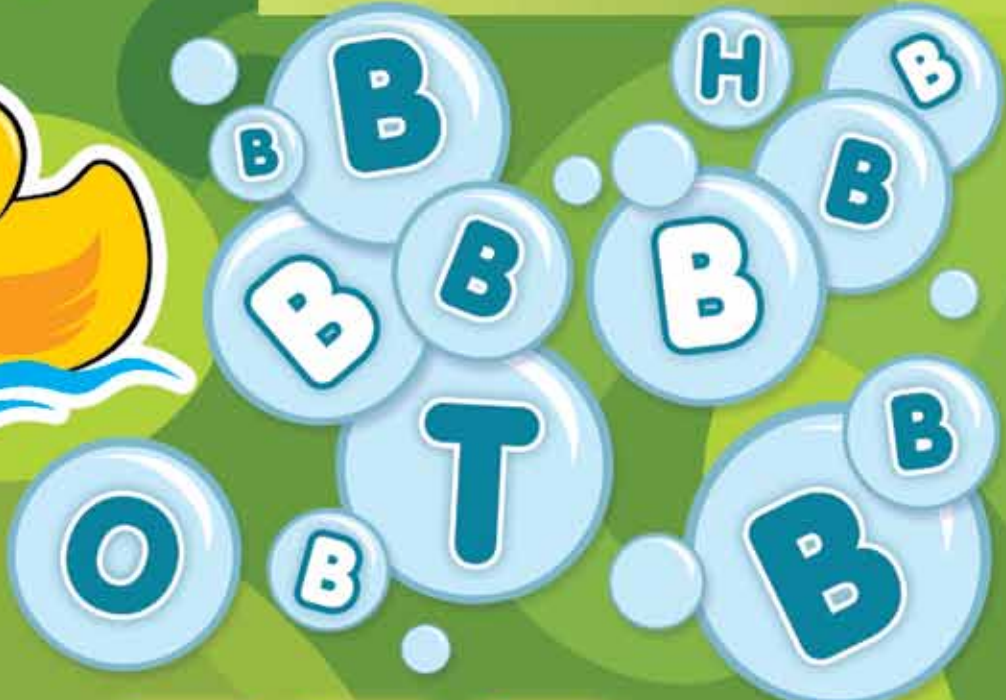


Rubber Duck Differences!

These rubber ducks may look the same, but they're not! Can you find the seven differences between them?

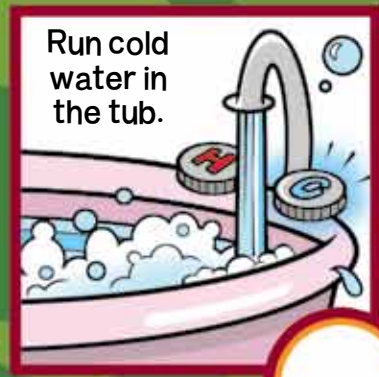
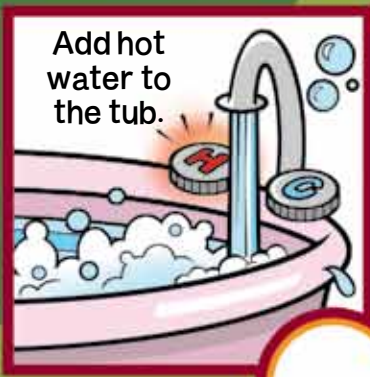


Pop all the bubbles with the letter 'B' on them! Then unscramble the letters on the remaining bubbles to find out what you should stay away from in your bathroom.

Safety Fact:
Approximately 16,000 children under age 5 are treated in U.S. hospitals for scald burns annually.

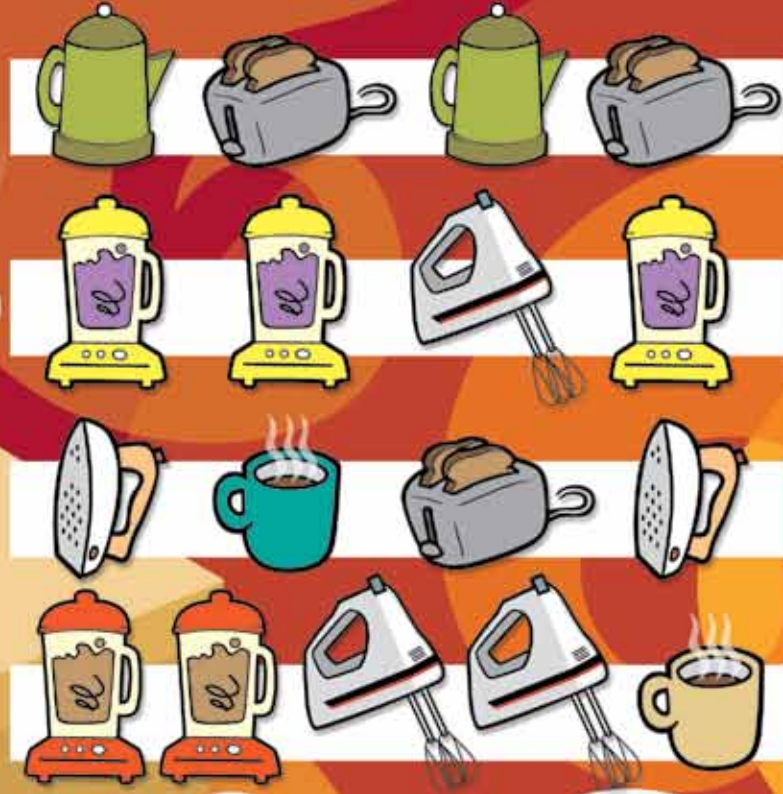


Kettle Conundrum!

Safety Fact:

Approximately 65 percent of children under age 4 who were hospitalized for burn injuries, were scalded by hot liquids.

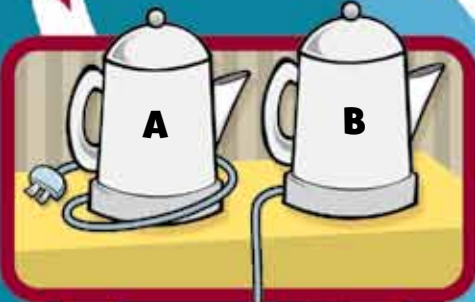
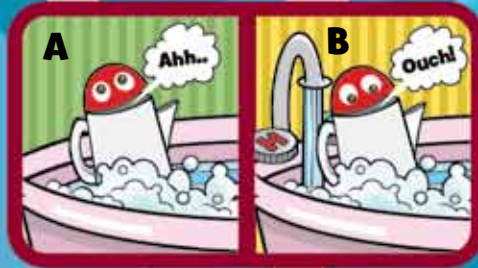
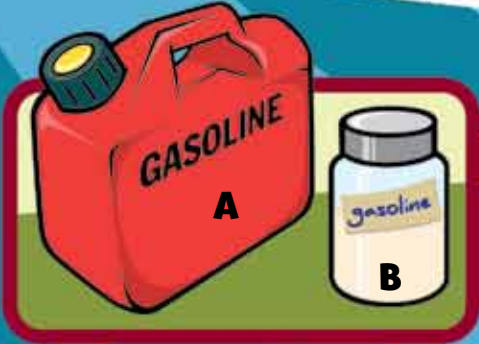
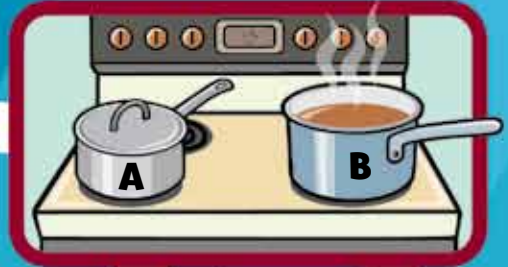




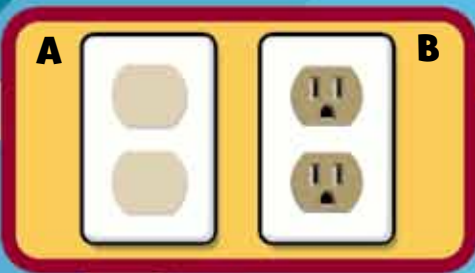
MAZE OF DANGERS!

Safety Tips!

- 1 If you see a red gasoline container, do not touch it or try to open it.
- 2 If you smell gasoline vapors, leave the area and tell an adult.

Safety Fact:

Nearly 50 percent of children injured in fires or fire-related incidents are under age 5.

Use the grid below to draw a floor plan of your house and find TWO EXITS from each room. Windows can be used as emergency exits, too! Remember to designate a MEETING PLACE at a safe distance outside your home.
